## **Director's Note**

Like the 6 spellers striving for spelling greatness, I have never let this cast & crew settle for less. When moving through the stages of production, despite any

setbacks experienced, we all, as a team, worked to come to each rehearsal better than before. Having actors & crew that were always willing to put in that extra time to fine-tune the work or set time aside to have a conversation about the show was the most inspiring part of this process and I am grateful to each and everyone of you.

Another aspect of this show vital to my desire for directing is the improvisation. Having spent the past 3 years (and counting) with UMBC's Dog Collar Comedy, directing this musical became even more my element and getting to watch the spontaneity from these actors for whatever I throw at them has been the most fulfilling part. Each of them continuously learn new traits of their character and step further into their character's reality. You would think after rehearsing the same numbers & dialogue multiple nights a week it would become exhausting, but I truly am wowed and amazed by the variety brought to me at every rehearsal, and tonight will be no exception.

Although this show is a "comedy-musical", there is a lot underneath the surface that makes this show so special to me. You can ask any one of the actors you will see on stage tonight what I think is the most important part of a theater performance, and hopefully you would get one of two words: organic & believable. No matter how bizarre, quirky, or just flat out stupid a script can be, its always important that the audience can relate & feel something real. This show will definitely mark that bizarre category, but more than anything, I hope through the goofs & bits, you see real children. As you watch these (not-so) middle schoolers take on the Spelling Bee, I ask that you closely watch their perils & pitfalls amongst greatness, and then ask yourself where in your life you may also have been in those same places. In each of the spellers, there are unique, yet universal aspects about their youth that I hope you can relate to as I have. These are not just caricatures, but children I have seen, children I know, and the child I used to be. Let this show bring out the inner kid in you in only the best ways and let the stories that unfold help heal the parts of you that you didn't know others felt too.
